#### - Troop and Patrol Structure

Development of the Scout's leadership skills and overall self confidence is a main benefit from Scouting. The Patrol structure enables this by providing activities and responsibilities for each patrol member to grow



– Troop Meetings

There are a number of meetings associated with the Troop. The <u>main meeting for Scouts</u> is the Troop meeting on Thursday evenings outlined below – however for completeness all the meetings are included

#### – Scout Uniform

There are two types of scout uniform – Class A and Class B

#### Class A

Class A is the formal uniform and is worn:

• To scout meetings (except in the summer when Class B is permitted)



 When traveling to and from Scout events (camping and other outdoor activities) as this enables the boy scout insurance for outdoor events (note: Only the shirt is required, and can be taken off once at the event)

#### Class B

Class B is the informal uniform and is worn:

- Under Class A uniforms (except in the summer when Class Bs are used instead of Class As)
- On events and activities where the Troop is conducting events or public volunteer activities



• Note: Class B t-shirts are available from the Troop Quartermaster

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Troop One has two main fundraising events the provide support to activities during the year, subsidize participation in summer and winter camps, contribute to high adventure trips, and fund overall Troop operations:

#### (1) November: Christmas Wreath & Tree Sales (2) February: Spaghetti Supper

Sales and the resulting Troop funds rely on the Scout's participation to be successful. This is often not a natural skill for Scouts, and will stretch some out of their comfort zone. However, view this as a learning opportunity. **Participation by** <u>all scouts is expected</u> – along with support and encouragement from the parents.

#### **Troop Funding** – Subsidies and Commissions

Income and sales rely on scout participation to be successful – in return scouts are eligible for Subsidies and Commissions. Amounts are announced once fundraisers are complete, typically in March or early April

	Subsidy		Commission
How do the programs work?	An amount determined by the Troop goes towards eligible scouts for winter camp, summer camp, and high adventure trips		A percentage of personal sales from the two events can be used by the scout can use towards scouting events
How do scouts qualify?	A scout who sells a combined \$50 amount in the two fundraisers qualifies for subsidy	+	A scout that sells a minimum of \$100, starts to earn 20% of their sales
What are some examples?	<ul> <li>2019 year: Subsidy was \$335 per Scout:</li> <li>High adventure trips was \$250</li> <li>Summer Camp subsidy was \$50</li> <li>Winter Camp Subsidy was \$35</li> </ul>		If a scout sells \$500 of wreaths, and another \$100 of spaghetti tickets for a total of \$600, the scout would earn \$120 dollars

<u>Scouts are eligible for both Subsidies and Commissions</u> – these reduce the Scout's cost to attend winter and summer camps, high adventure trips, and other events. "Paying their own way" imparts pride in the Scout

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#### **Advancement Process**

#### – Scouting Ranks, Advancement, and Green Bar



#### Scout Handbook

- Green Bar: New Scouts should focus on advancing through the initial ranks – commonly referred to as Green Bar
- Rank advancement is driven from the activities outlined in the Scout Handbook
- Note: Working on merit badges is encouraged but not necessary for Scout through First Class rank advancement

#### Scout Handbook + Merit Badges

- Rank advancement continues to be driven from the activities in the Scout Handbook
- Merit badges are part of rank advancement. Badges earned during all rank levels count towards advancement

#### **Boards of Review**

Progression to the next rank requires the scout to successfully complete a "Board of Review" conducted by Troop leadership – this ensures the scout has a complete understanding of their current rank requirement

The Scout Handbook contains the majority of the information require by Scouts to progress through the ranks, along with logs (in the back of the handbook) to log camping, hikes, etc.



- Early in the Scout career, work on Youth Protection section in your Scout handbook with your parents. This is in the front section of the handbook. Have your parent sign that you have completed it with them. That is one of your <u>first</u> "sign-offs".
- Look at requirements for "Scout" in Chapter 1. You should be able to complete all of Scout and most of Tenderfoot before Summer Camp time. You will probably be working on 2<sup>nd</sup> Class and have some of the requirements for 1<sup>st</sup> class completed by the end of the summer.
- Towards the back of the book you will find logs to keep track of campouts, hiking, and other activities complete these as you go

**TIP**: Buy the Scout Handbook that is SPIRAL bound and the zip-able cover. The book is used at every meeting and on campouts and so need some protection!

#### **Advancement Process**

#### - Merit Badge Process and Blue Card Steps

#### Merit Badges

Merit badges are key to advancement for Star through Eagle ranks. To earn the Eagle rank 13 Eagle Scout merit badges as well as 8 other merit badges are required

#### Merit Badge Blue Card Steps

Blue Cards are required for all merit badges:

- Get approval from a Unit Leader for badge you plan to earn; contact an appropriate Counselor (list of counselors on the wall of the meeting room) – complete Section A
- Print specific merit badge requirements from the Troop website – record progress in Section B; Counselor initials completion
- 3. Once all requirements are completed:
  - Section C1: Counselor review and signoff completion – Scout to place this section in Advancement Box for processing
  - Section C2: Counselor and Scout Master sign Scout retains for their records
  - Section C3: Counselor retains copy for records

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We love camping in Troop 1! To enjoy the experience it is important to be prepared, have some basic gear (next few pages), and take care for yourself. Here are a few tips and tricks:

Troop Gear The Troop has the following supplies that the scouts can borrow for events – see one of the scout Quarter Masters • Tents • Backpacks	Stay Dry Stay Warm	<ul> <li>Plan for the weather – check the forecast as you pack</li> <li>Being wet/cold is miserable and can lead to extreme cold (dangerous)</li> <li>Wear rain gear – put it on before you are wet</li> <li>Change into dry clothes before getting into your sleeping bag (get out of items damp from sweat)</li> <li>Wear clean dry socks and a wooly hat in your sleeping bag when cold</li> <li>Use chemical hand warmers when cold (put some in your sleeping bag)</li> <li>Eat a snack (not sugar) before going to bed – you stomach will create warmth as you sleep</li> </ul>
	Have enough food (plus extra)	<ul> <li>On Troop campouts the patrols will organize their own food (pack some snacksjust incase)</li> <li>When backpacking – or when you provide your own food – pack extra just to be safe. Bring snacks that provide energy (nuts, dried fruits, etc)</li> <li>In the winter pack some hot coco mix for later in the evening</li> </ul>
	Check / know your gear	<ul> <li>Check all your gear is complete and working before you go – know how it works and how to use it</li> <li>Break in your boots/shoes ahead of time</li> </ul>

#### - Backpacking Packing Checklist

Backpacking truly gets the Troop disconnected from their normal environment and provides an exciting challenge. Often gear is shared to spread the load. Here is a list that works well for most situations generally:

The Middle Tennessee Council Scouts BSA summer camp offers more than 60 Merit Badges including 9 Eagle Scout Merit Badges along with many other fun and adventure activities.

Troop 1 routinely has ~40 Scouts attend summer camp each year. It's a great place for new Scouts to get to know their fellow Scouts, make new friends, and work on their Scouting skills

There are always Troop 1 leaders and experienced Scouts on site leading and guiding the Scouts to ensure safety and success of each of the Scouts

Personal items such as medications are managed / administered from Troop leaders on site

Cost – as mentioned in the commissions section, Scouts can earn commissions that can be applied to pay for / offset the camp costs
